## **YPG** boasts brand new fire station

#### By Mark Schauer

Local fires and medical emergencies can now be handled more efficiently than ever, partly due to a new fire station at Laguna Army Airfield. The new facility was dedicated in early November.

The ceremony consisted of a remarks from a variety of YPG senior leaders prior to the traditional roll-in ceremony of a fire truck by the distinguished guests and firefighters.

"Roll-in ceremonies are a long tradition dating back to the beginning days of the first organized fire companies," said Gerald Ball, chief. "Fire companies responded to fires with manual fire pumps mounted on horse-drawn carriages. After hours of battling flames with leather hoses, they would return to the fire





house, unhitch the horses and board them in stables, then the entire company would participate in rolling the pumper carriage back into the station. We honor those forefathers with this roll-in of the first fire truck into the bay of our new fire station."

In lieu of a ribbon cutting, lengths of fire hose suspended between each of the bay doors were uncoupled by YPG Commander Col. Ross Poppenberger, Garrison Manager Gordon Rogers, Command Sgt Maj. Christopher Prosser, and Ball.

for a minimum of 144 hours every pay period, working 48 hours straight followed by two days at home.

"Firefighters will be here 24 hours a day, seven days a week," said Ball. "Though technically it is a temporary station, we are very appreciative of the upgraded living conditions." Given the climate of the desert environment, the new facility will provide extra protection to trucks and other equipment from the ravages of extreme heat.

"Another huge benefit is that we get two vehicles under cover that weren't previously beneath cover," said Poppenberger. "Being able to maintain our fire trucks and the capabilities our firefighters need ties in to Army readiness."

Reminder: For the Health Benefit Plans and Stand Alone Dental Plan, there are now four premium levels available to choose from: Single; Single plus Child(ren); Single Plus Spouse and Family (Single plus Spouse plus Child(ren).

#### Health Benefit Plans

You may enroll in any of our Health Benefit Plans, either the DOD NAF Employee Health Benefit Plan (DODHBP) (often referred to as Aetna), the Stand Alone Dental Plan, or one of our Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs), where available. to be substantial, with the crowd numbering in the thousands. Everyone is advised to circle the date on calendars now.

Activities will be many. These include displays of military equipment tested at the proving ground, historic exhibits, parachuting, a play area for young people, musical entertainment, food and drinks, evening fireworks, and much more. Best of all, it will cost nothing to attend.

Special parking lots are being laid out and YCAT will offer bus service to and from downtown Yuma and the Foothills. Keep your eyes open in future months for more details.

Though the Army first came on a permanent basis to the desert southwest in 1850 when Soldiers constructed Fort Yuma overlooking the Yuma Crossing of the Colorado River, it wasn't until World War II that the beginnings of today's Yuma Proving Ground formed.

The U.S. Army Corps of
Engineers opened the Yuma Test
Branch below Laguna Dam on
the Colorado River in 1943. This
location was considered the most
desirable spot in the country for
testing portable combat bridges
because of the abundance of swift
flowing water that engineers could
control as they wished. Dozens of
bridges were constructed over the

river, much of the labor performed by former Italian prisoners of war. Some of the tested bridge designs were successful, others needed improvement and a few were outright failures – collapsing into the river or breaking apart into segments. In late 1944, rice and hemp plants were grown next to the Colorado River to establish realistic conditions for testing troop and vehicle movements in preparation for the expected invasion of Japan.

At the same time the test branch began operating, the Army established Camp Laguna a few miles to the west to train troops in mechanized warfare. Camp Laguna was one of 12 major U.S. Army desert training camps in the California-Arizona Maneuver Area (CAMA). An 18,000 square mile area chosen by General George S. Patton, this became the training ground for over one million Soldiers eventually deployed to combat areas overseas

Upward of 15,000 troops were stationed at Camp Laguna at any one time for periods generally lasting six months. The purpose of the challenging training was to prepare soldiers for a severe life of combat in the deserts of North Africa or one of World War II's other combat fronts. Camp Laguna and the other CAMA installations were crucial in preparing Army personnel for combat. Camp Laguna was deactivated and demolished in 1944.

After the war, the Yuma Test Branch remained in operation, but testing activities were turned toward the effect of the desert environment on engineering equipment, such as high-speed tractors, semi-trailers and revolving cranes. In 1950, the test branch closed, only to reopen one year later with a new name, Yuma Test Station, and a greatly expanded mission.

This new mission saw the testing workload greatly expand beyond its river and desert environmental roots. It became a multi-purpose test center that took on the lion's share of the nation's artillery testing workload, with the longest overland artillery range in the country. In

addition, many types of armored vehicles, armored systems, and air delivery systems began to be tested.

As one of the geographically largest military installations in the western world, U.S. Army Yuma Proving Ground's 75-year history has witnessed a huge and varied workload. Today's mission, as throughout its history, is to ensure that weapon systems and equipment issued to American Soldiers function safely and as intended -- all the time, without fail. This workload directly contributes to America's national defense, a source of intense pride for each of the 2400 Yuma County residents who work at the proving ground.

# ——— *Chaplain's Corner* ——— Thanksgiving Proclamation

By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation. (New York, 3 October 1789)

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor-- and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness.

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be-- That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks--for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation--for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war—for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed--for the peaceable and rational man-

ner, in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted--for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us. and also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions-- to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually--to render our national government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed—to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord--To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the encrease of science among them and us--and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.

# New generation of armored vehicle tested at YPG

The M113 Armored Personnel Carrier and its variants are iconic vehicles in mechanized infantry history.

First fielded in 1962, the M113 was ubiquitous during the conflict in Vietnam and has seen service in virtually every American military action in the ensuing decades. Though largely surpassed in both use and operation by the M2 Bradley, variants of the M113 continue in operation to this day.

Nonetheless, the M113 was built for a different generation of warfighting, and the recently developed Armored Multi-Purpose Vehicle (AMPV) is intended to dramatically increase Soldiers' transport capabilities. The AMPV's five variants—a general purpose vehicle, mission command vehicle, mortar carrier, and medical evacuation and treatment vehicles—have nearly 80% more interior

volume than their predecessor, and significantly more power and survivability. Cooling and electrical systems are also upgraded to accommodate both existing and future upgrades.

All variants of the vehicle are slated to undergo extensive testing at YPG.

"We have a wide array of testing going on in Yuma," said Shelton Raine, program manager. "We'll be doing all the mortar firing on the mortar carrier variant as well as reliability and performance testing on the other four variants. We're trying to do a lot of testing in parallel to meet a very aggressive test schedule."

Presently, the mortar carrier variant is being tested by YPG's Munitions and Weapons Division.

"We're verifying the integration of the M121 mortar system on our vehicle," said John Portaro, mortar carrier test lead. "We want to ensure

there are no surprises and everything functions normally."

Integrating the 120mm mortar into the vehicle takes extensive work, requiring a punishing test

fire regimen to insure the system performs as expected.

As they do so, testers pay close attention to the effects of firing each round.

"The M113 mortar carrier weighs about 30,000 pounds," said Chad Bloomingdale, test officer. "This vehicle is 80,000 pounds. We're conducting all this testing to see if that has any effect on performance or firing."

YPG supports the test firing with a wide variety of personnel, from weapons operators and observers to high speed camera operators, data collectors, and conditioning chamber personnel. Some of the test rounds are conditioned to various temperatures and brought to the mortar immediately prior to being fired.

"Yuma has the infrastructure and tough environment to really stress the vehicles and give us a more thorough test," said Raine. "It gives us confidence in its technical


maturity coming out of this phase."

The test firing of the mortar carrier variant is only the start of evaluations of all aspects of the AMPV's performance that will last for more than a year.

"We get excellent support at YPG," added Portaro. "Everybody here will go out of their way to do whatever is necessary to get the job done. We work together really well."

# **Commander addresses workforce** in all-hands meeting

Col. Ross Poppenberger, YPG commander, addressed personnel across the command via video teleconference in mid-November.

Over 200 members of the YPG team were present in a hangar at

Laguna Army Airfield to hear his vision for the command and ask questions as personnel at Cold Regions Test Center watched by video link.

Also speaking at the event were Technical Director Julio Dominguez and Safety Director Mike Demcko.

Poppenberger announced that YPG was the busiest test center in the Army Test and Evaluation Command (ATEC) for the eighth consecutive fiscal year, and praised the YPG workforce for making it possible.

"We have high customer satisfaction ratings," he said. "Our rates are better and our turnaround times are better. Product managers choose YPG because of the high level of expertise and outstanding long-term relationships."

Poppenberger said that he and all levels of ATEC are aware of how busy the proving ground is and that many workers are required to work overtime to achieve the mission. He pledged to make every effort to avoid excessive overtime in the interests of safety and morale, but observed that YPG's test schedule driven in large part by its sterling reputation for excellence within the test and evaluation community.

"The workload is high-- that is the drawback of being great."

A major part of Poppenberger's address concerned results of the most recently conducted command climate survey. Garnering a 54% participation rate, Poppenberger was mostly impressed by the results, particularly those that indicated an overwhelming majority feel discrimination is not tolerated within the command and that all personnel are treated with respect.

"There is opportunity for everybody at YPG. We will continue working to sustain YPG as a solid and diverse organization.

Addressing feedback about communication, Poppenberger said he and the proving ground's entire senior leadership have open door policies and that communication is a two-way street.

"If you see me anywhere, ask me a question. I'm approachable."

Poppenberger concluded by encouraging the workforce to participate in the upcoming Organization Day on December 7th, the proving ground's first such event in a number of years, as well as the 75th Anniversary event on Saturday, February 3, 2018, saying he sees both events as morale-building rewards for a job well done.

"We're going to give back to you and give back to the community," he said.

In his remarks, Dominguez announced his upcoming retirement and praised the remarkable progress YPG has made in creating a more diverse workforce during his tenure: whereas when he started working here in 1985 YPG had one Hispanic supervisor, today 26% of supervisors are Hispanic, mirroring closely the 27% of the workforce



- Heart Health- People with high levels of gratitude show less inflammation in tests and better circulation. Those who kept gratitude journals showed improved heart rates and reduced their cardiac risk.
- Better Sleep- Writing down a few things to be grateful for before bed helps quiet your mind and allows for a more restful slumber.
- Physical Health Benefits- People who practice gratitude techniques self-report healthier behaviors and more interest in physical activity such as daily exercise.
- Optimism & Friendships- Studies found that expressing gratitude daily helps with your outlook on life. This in turn attracts more positive people your way and forges stronger, longer-lasting friendships.

Practicing gratitude may seem like a chore but here are some easy ways to make gratitude a part of your


daily routine. Be sure to include your children in these techniques as well; the benefits of gratitude help children to process the world around them more positively and lead to healthy development and perception.
